Second Sunday in Lent

“Eternal Lord of love, behold your church Walking once more the pilgrim way of Lent, Led by your cloud by day, by night your fire, moved by your love and toward your presence bent; far off yet here—the goal of all desire.”

So writes Thomas Cain (b. 1931) in a poem that is now hymn 149 in our hymnal. “Behold your church walking once more the pilgrim way of Lent ... far off yet here ... the goal of all desire.”

Jesus asked, “Who do people say that I am,” and the disciples offer various common opinions. He then goes on to ask, “But who do *you* say that I am?” Peter, the first disciple immediately responds, “You are the Messiah,” that is, God’s anointed bearer of salvation. This evokes from Jesus a strong command not to tell anyone. The Gospel follows immediately with the Passion prediction, foretelling that the Son of Man, a powerful figure in the first part of the Gospel (2:10, 28) must be rejected, suffer, die and rise again. Peter then takes him aside and “begins to reprimand him” (the verb used earlier when Jesus silences demons, 3:12, or calms the raging sea, 4:39). And Jesus rebukes him.

History sided with Jesus on the matter of the necessity of the cross. We have traced the sign of the cross on the foreheads in prayer, in ash, and today, in oil. We have been covered with the sign of the cross in blessing and forgiveness. Throughout our service we make the sign of the cross as an act of recollection. We are a people of the Cross, marked — even branded — by it in our baptism, and living daily under its sign. So what does it mean to be a people of the Cross? What does it mean to agree that there is something absolutely central about the suffering, rejection, and death of Jesus for our understanding of

human life, and how it is to be lived? Jesus Christ, who put all our brokenness on the cross, so that one day we might be made whole. Christians pray, eat, serve, laugh and cry together all under that cross. We are a community with peculiar habits. And we walk “the pilgrim way of Lent these forty days” so that we may one day understand the glory of God’s love.
